

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### From the Rector

In the beginning was the Word and the Word was with God and the Word was God.

This familiar verse from the poetic prologue of John's gospel is read on the first Sunday after Christmas each year.

In a way, it is John's version of the Christmas story. Although there is no baby, no manger, no shepherds or kings, there is the Word. For John the Evangelist, all the many beloved words of our Christmas story can be expressed in one Word. The Word that was in the beginning with God. The Word that is Life and the Light of all people. The Word made flesh, Jesus Christ.

Today, we are achingly aware of the power of words to harm and divide and dissemble. As we begin a new year at Christ's Church, may we be a people who speak the word of truth in love. May we cherish the gift of words to deepen relationships and communicate a vision of our future.

This year, I am taking a small step toward being a more effective communicator by traveling to Cuernavaca, Mexico, for a diocesan sponsored two-week Spanish language immersion program. I've never studied Spanish before and I hope to grow as a communicator, both culturally and liturgically.

## From the Curate

So much of worship revolves around remembering...the fancy Greek word we use for it "anamnesis." Sunday mornings, we listen to God's Word and hear a Sermon to remember how God has acted and our response to it, and then hear why this still matters to us today from the preacher. In the Eucharistic Prayers, the first half of the prayer is the story of the Salvation History of God, the good and the bad. We do this in worship for us to remember how God has acted in time, and to remember who God calls us to be because of it. While we are all part of this larger salvation history, we all have a story of how God calls us all individually.


One of the most humbling things I have had the privilege, of as a priest, is hearing these stories of everyone I encounter...These little Gospel moments where someone, in the most mundane places, will share with me all of the things that God has done for them. It can be standing waiting on a platform for a train into the city, or getting my hair cut at Frank's Barber Shop that someone will tell me how God has acted in their life in great and small ways. In these small encounters hearing people's testimonies of God's work in their lives, I get to bear witness to God's light piercing through the world proclaiming the kingdom.

In John's Gospel, he recounts that John the Baptist did not come into the world as the light, but to bear witness and testify to the light. The Baptist's job in this world was to bear witness to incarnate God entering into the world and starting his ministry proclaiming a new Kingdom of peace and love. Much like John, we are all called to bear witness and testify to God's Kingdom breaking in this world in our own lives and the lives of the people we meet. Bearing witness to how God has acted and is acting in our world is one of the most powerful ways that we can proclaim the kingdom.

As we enhance our property with upgrades, we also are strengthening our connections to our communities in Rye and Port Chester.

We are thankful for the ability to share our resources and space with the **Rye Boy Scouts** and **Blue Skies'** After-School Program. The Blue Skies' After-School program is a tutoring program that takes place at Christ's Church Rye every day from 3:00-6:00pm for elementary-age children from Port Chester. We welcome anyone who would like to get involved, sharing the gift of time with these children with reading and math.

Additionally, we are in discernment for the updates to the Sanctuary. Brad Smith is spearheading efforts to ensure that renovations to the sanctuary will begin in May, 2024. He has established a committee to prioritize projects based on the original requests of the capital campaign along with an architecture firm that specializes in church work.

- Cleaning out the inside of the steam boiler (provides heat)
- Upgrades to our slate roof. The work that started last spring just was completed.
- A new pollinator garden project, generously donated by Liz Garrett is working with Hilary Garland and Bruce Smith and will break ground this Spring in the grassy area at the corner of Rectory Street and Milton Road
- Nichole Reiff reported that over 500 coats had been collected for the fall coat drive.
- Karen Schulz created lovely brass Christ's Church ornaments for newcomers.
- The 13th annual Christmas tree sale, blessed with many volunteers and gorgeous weather, was a huge success, bringing trees, and Christmas spirit to our community.

# Children and Youth Programming

### Sunday School

Sunday School continues! This year, drop off for children will be in the Parish Hall from 9:30am - 10:00am. At 10, the Sunday School teachers will bring the children into grade specific rooms to take part in this year's program called "The Jesus Project." Grounded in story-telling, craft projects, games and conversation each class will center on Jesus's question to his disciples: "Who do you say that I am?" At 10:30am, all the children will be brought into the Sanctuary, where they will sit with their teacher in the first two pews for the duration of the service. A dedicated group of high school volunteers, mentored and supported by adult staff and clergy, help our younger parishioners learn and grow in faith.

### Confirmation

Our 9th grade Confirmation Class continues their work to be ready for Confirmation next spring. This is the second year of a two-year preparation, and 21 teens are engaged in the process. This year began in September with a weekend retreat at Frost Valley YMCA Camp in the Catskill Mountains. The retreat provided a great opportunity for the Confirmands to reconnect with each other after the summer, focus on their faith and what it means to be Confirmed, and have some fun together. It also afforded them the time to be with their clergy, Kate and Ryan, their new Confirmation Leaders, Jessica Lodato and Michael Bagley, and Youth Ministries Coordinator Tyler James.

Since the retreat, the group has met bi-weekly to continue their preparations. With Kate, Ryan, Jess, and Mike, they have explored the Baptismal Covenant and Profession of Faith, working toward a deeper understanding of what it means to say yes to Confirmation and have been challenged to think about how to apply the lessons of the Gospels to their daily lives. This December the Confirmation Class participated in the numerous Advent and Christmas services and events, serving as acolytes, helping with the pageant, and simply being present during this important part of the church year. Classes resume in January, and we look forward to welcoming Bishop Allen Shin on April 7 for Confirmation.



# Christ's Church Nursery School

We are currently wrapping up our Admissions Season for the 2024-2025 school year. As new families come for visits, we often explain the CCNS difference. Other schools will talk about being child-centered, playcentered, and a fun, safe space for children; no doubt we are all that! However, CCNS has something unique many other schools do not spend the money on or try to include in their curriculum: a deliberate literacy program and a block room curriculum. We know that these classes are value-added experiences that benefit all students, and we are so happy to be able to include them.

#### **Block Room**

Learning through play is the hallmark of childhood, and the Block Room at Christ's Church Nursery School is the ideal environment to facilitate all that play has to offer a developing learner. When children enter the Block Room, they not only build amazing structures, but they also build imagination, confidence, and lifelong skills that support academic success.

Block play encourages a child to be creative, think critically, collaborate, and negotiate with others as they turn imagination into tangible outcomes. They become resilient problem solvers while learning about balance, gravity, and spatial awareness. Fine and gross motor skills develop along with risk assessment as they place blocks strategically. Academic concepts are visually and tactically reinforced in areas of shapes and numbers, measurement and fractions, perimeter, area and volume, testing hypotheses, understanding simple machines and engineering concepts, and social studies as they build cities, roads, and homes.

Here at CCNS, we are so proud to give children open-ended experiences with the freedom to explore and engage in valuable play that makes them proud, innovative, and successful.



# Christ's Church Nursery School (cont.)

### Literacy

When it comes to building the foundations of reading, CCNS believes that more is more. Each week, CCNS students attend literacy classes with Mrs. Courntey Donohue and have the opportunity to build "science of reading" skills while also experiencing the joys of classic children's literature. During each session of the CCNS Literacy program, children spend the first half of class focused on "reading science." Each lesson is heavily influenced by the Wilson Reading System, "Fundations". The more opportunities children have to learn reading rules, the better they will be for elementary school.

Every class includes a review of letter/sound correspondence, alphabetic knowledge, recognition of vowels and consonants, enunciation of separate syllables, print concepts, and a discussion of basic sentence structure. For the child that reading will come easy; these practices will accelerate them to be fluent, intuitive readers quickly in elementary school. This practice is vital for the child who may have reading difficulties in the future, as they will need to rely on their knowledge of the rules to read successfully. Either way, early, consistent exposure to letters, sounds, and rules is key for all readers. Children love repetition, and they build confidence from consistent practice. Every student finds this portion of the class exciting and never tedious. They are delighted to have these knowledge. Now, rules are necessary, but so is fun! CCNS is built on the concept of play-based learning and language-rich experiences.

The second part of each literacy class is dedicated to literature study. Mrs. Donohue always says, "I never read a story to our students. We read it together. It's so important for children to be invited into a book. Their observations should always be welcomed." Through open-ended questions, story time becomes a play-based experience instead of a passive-listening one. For Mrs. Donohue, no vocabulary word is too sophisticated for a child to understand, and no plot is too complicated for kids to retell. Children's literature, with its playful language and detailed illustrations, provides the perfect setting for children to articulate their understanding of a book. And wow, can they articulate! Move over Oprah and Reese, CCNS students have sharp observations and recommendations worthy of a book club stamp on Amazon!
